Legal bath salts a rising drug issue

Phrases like "Ivory Snow," "Vanilla Sky" and "Aura" may sound blissful and innocent, but these words are actually names of new, dangerous - and legal - drugs masking themselves as "bath salts."

While these bath salts were relatively unheard of just a few years ago, use of this substance has been on the rise, generating concern from agencies such as the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration.

Bath salts are generally sold online and in smoke shops in packets that are labeled with warnings, such as "not for human consumption." However, they are being sold in
